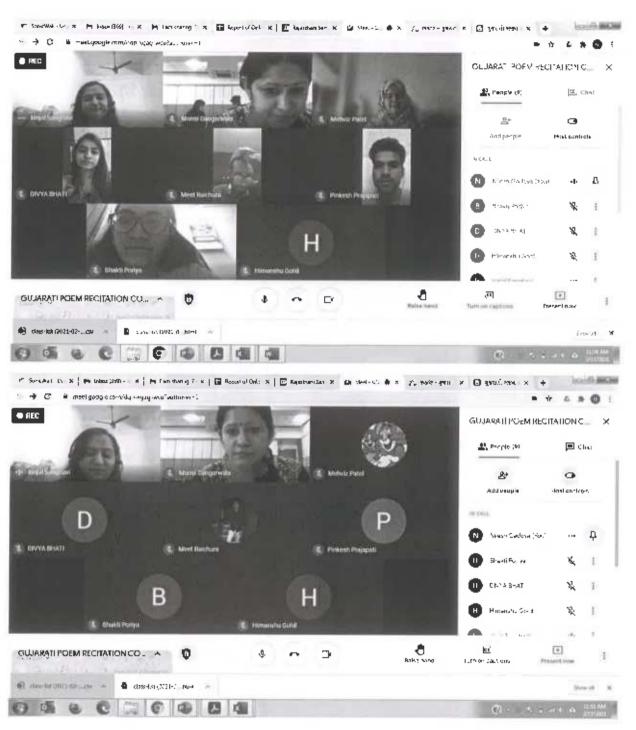
Report of Gujarati Literary Association Academic Year 2020-21

REPORT ON COST ACCOUNTING PRESENTATIONS (A.Y 2021-22)

TYBCAF Students gave the presentation in the subject of Cost Accounting on the topic "Inter-firm Comparison", wherein two firms from the same industry were compared with the help of ratio analysis.

Detailed report of inter-firm comparison is given below:

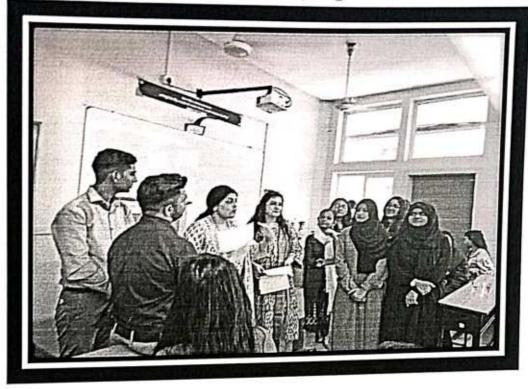

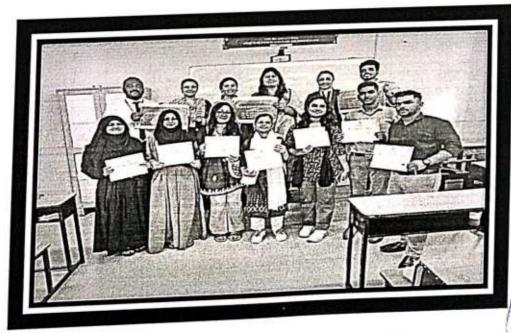

Report on "Inter-firm Comparison" presentations by TYBCAF Students (A.Y 2023-24)

TYBCAF Students gave the presentation in the subject of Cost Accounting on the topic "Inter-firm Comparison", wherein two firms from the same industry were compared with the help of ratio analysis. 21 Teams were formed comprising of 6 to 7 students per group. Presentations were given on 1st August, 2023 and 5th August, 2023 by TYBCAF Division A and on 31st July, 2023 and 7th August, 2023 by TYBCAF Division B. Students have presented their findings on various pairs of companies, conducting comparative analyses to assess the strengths and weaknesses of each company within its respective industry. This report summarises the key findings and conclusions from each group's presentation. Here is a summary of their findings:

TYBCAF DIV A

Group 1: HDFC Bank Ltd vs. ICICI Bank Ltd-

Group 1 compared HDFC Bank Ltd and ICICI Bank Ltd, concluding that both banks are fundamentally strong. However, HDFC Bank Ltd was found to be slightly better in terms of profitability and operational efficiency.

Group 2: Berger Paints vs. Nerolac Paints

In their analysis, Group 2 concluded that Nerolac Paints is one of the top brands in the industry, attributing its popularity and trust to continuous efforts.

Group 3: Uber vs. Ola

Group 3 compared Uber and Ola, finding that Uber is more profitable than Ola based on their analysis.

Group 4: Big Bazaar vs. Star Bazaar

Group 4 conducted an interfirm comparison between Big Bazaar and Star Bazaar and concluded that Star Bazaar is superior to Big Bazaar based on financial ratios.

Group 5: Tata Motors vs. Mahindra and Mahindra

From their financial ratio analysis, Group 5 concluded that Mahindra and Mahindra is more profitable, while Tata Motors is considered stable.

Group 6: Infosys vs. TCS

Group 6 determined that Infosys holds a better position compared to TCS, with TCS being considered stable.

Group 7: Tata Steel vs. JSW Steel

Group 7's comparison of Tata Steel and JSW Steel led to the conclusion that investing in Tata Steel is more preferable due to its status as one of the world's most geographically diversified steel producers.



Group 8: Paytm vs. PayPal

Group 8 recognized that both Paytm and PayPal have significantly impacted the digital payment landscape, offering valuable solutions to users worldwide.

Group 9: HPCL vs. BPCL

Group 9 conducted an interfirm comparison between HPCL and BPCL and concluded that BPCL is slightly better than HPCL based on their analysis.

Group 10: Raymond vs. Arvind Ltd

In their analysis of Raymond and Arvind Ltd, Group 10 found that Raymond is more profitable based on ratios and various factors such as product differentiation, market capitalization, and diversification. However, they noted that Raymond has a higher debt load and declining shares, while Arvind Ltd is still growing and has substantial potential.

Group 11: Bic Cello vs. Flair Industry

Group 11's comparison of Bic Cello and Flair Industry concluded that Bic Cello's reputation for reliability and affordability makes it a preferred choice for budget-conscious consumers, whereas Flair Pen's emphasis on vibrant ink colors and a smooth writing experience appeals to those seeking a more expressive and comfortable writing tool. Therefore, Bic Cello was considered superior to Flair Pens.

Group 12: Tata Power vs. Adani Power

Group 12 conducted an interfirm comparison between Tata Power and Adani Power and concluded that Adani Power is better than Tata Power based on their analysis of financial ratios.

TYBCAF DIV B

Group 1: Zomato vs. Swiggy

Group I compared Zomato and Swiggy, highlighting that both companies excel in delivering quality food to consumers. Zomato was identified as the market leader in terms of market share, marketing, innovation, and acquisitions. On the other hand, Swiggy stood out for its dedication to providing essential relief to delivery executives, leading to enhanced customer satisfaction.

Group 2: Indigo Airlines vs. SpiceJet Airways

Group 2 conducted an analysis of the aviation industry, concluding that Indigo Airlines outperformed SpiceJet Airways in market dominance, financial performance, fleet size, and potentially stronger customer service.

Group 3: Indigo Paints vs. Asian Paints

In comparing Indigo Paints and Asian Paints, Group 3 highlighted that both companies are reputable brands with a wide range of painting products. However, Asian Paints was found to have a higher book value and earnings per share (EPS), primarily due to its higher pricing strategy.

Group 4: D-Mart vs. Big Bazaar

Group 4 concluded that D-Mart is a top brand in the retail industry, earning customer trust through continuous efforts and offering attractive discounts.

Group 5: Tata Motors vs. Mahindra & Mahindra

Group 5 assessed Tata Motors and Mahindra & Mahindra in the automotive industry. They emphasized that both companies are formidable players, advising investors to carefully consider their investment objectives, risk tolerance, and long-term outlook when choosing between the two.

Group 6: Britannia vs. Nestle

Comparing Britannia and Nestle in the FMCG industry, Group 6 found that Nestle holds better long-term growth prospects due to its stronger brand portfolio, wider distribution network, and larger presence in emerging markets. Both companies are debt-free, though Britannia's debt increased slightly due to capacity expansion.

Group 7: Puma vs. Adidas

Group 7 conducted an interfirm comparison between Puma and Adidas, concluding that Adidas outperforms Puma based on their financial ratios. Group 8: Ambuja Cement vs. Shree Cement

Group 8 appreciates both Ambuja Cement and Shree Cement for their excellence in different ways. Ambuja Cement excels in sustainable practices and environmental commitment, while Shree Cement stands out for efficient production processes and strong financial performance.

Group 10: Infosys vs. HCL Technologies

Group 10's interfirm comparison concludes that HCL Technologies outperforms Infosys in terms of returns, based on financial ratios.

In summary, students have presented the comparative analysis of various companies across different sectors providing valuable insights into their strengths and weaknesses. These analyses can serve as valuable references for investors, stakeholders, and individuals interested in understanding the competitive landscape and financial performance of these companies in their respective industries.
